We will have a mini-conference on August 24-25 at our church. It will be 7-9:30 p.m. on Friday, Aug. 24 and Saturday 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Dan Prout of Sierra Ministries International and founder of Pray Nevada County will be leading a PRAYER IN THE MAKING Seminar. Dan was well received when he spoke at one of our Tahoe conferences and conducts this seminar regularly by popular request. He recently conducted one at Celtic Cross Presbyterian Church in Citrus Heights.

This seminar is open to the general public so anyone interested in learning more about prayer is encouraged to come. Paula likes to garden, travel, sew, knit - "housewife things." She chose Auburn Presbyterian Church after trying a few others. She is in the God's Goodtimers Life Group and also is active in Keenagers.

Paula reports she has always believed in Jesus Christ as she grew up in the Christian faith. Her grandmother had a lot of influence. She has had ups and downs along the way but the Lord was always there. One of her most impactful experiences was feeling like she saw Jesus come through the door just before her husband died. It was if Jesus had come to get him.

Shirley Hartford

Shirley was born in Minot, North Dakota, and raised in Karlsruhe, North Dakota. Karlsruhe was a German-Russian community and everyone went to the Catholic Church. Her grandparents all were born in Odessa, Russia. Today she and Lynn live in a hilltop setting a few blocks off of Mt. Vernon Road near Auburn.

Shirley went to a business college and took a job with Boeing when it was dealing with the Minuteman Missile. She stayed home for several years to have time with her two daughters. LIFE GROUP GATHERINGS

Some of you know that I've been starting support groups for people with peripheral neuropathy in many parts of Northern California. We started with one group in Auburn in 1998 and are now at 32 groups (two in Auburn) with one due to start in Truckee before this issue of the Chronicles is distributed. Our goal is to start 2010 with 50 groups or more blanketing Northern California so there would be a group within easy driving distance of every person with peripheral neuropathy in Northern California and Northern Nevada.



The original idea for Life Groups was to start a group, grow it to 12 - 18 members and then form two groups so there would be room for more people to be connected to the church - to blanket the church with small groups, not try to get the whole church into one group. This would make it more possible for the church to grow spiritually and in numbers. People would have a group that they could host in their home, deep friendships would develop, sharing of personal needs would reach much below the surface, and, thus, the message of God's Word would more easily be seen as applying to one's life. .

This would facilitate having groups at a variety of days and times. For example, we have several people asking for a weekend Life Group. One couple in this group has a work schedule that gets them up quite early during the week so the sleep schedule is early as well. Would anyone be interested in a group that met on Sunday morning 7:30-9:00 a.m.? The group could meet twice a month, share breakfast, fellowship, study, and prayer. There would be time to go over 9 a bit, if needed, and still get to church. Life Groups could meet other days and times during the week than they do now and make choices such as

whether the group meets each week or twice a month or something in between.

One of our prime membership focus areas is the pre-retired, early retired, and active retired. The Lord keeps sending these people to us. We have several large groups of these out of which many of our leaders come. This is also true of families with young children. Some of these groups are getting to the point there is limited space for new people. We need at least one, if not more, additional groups. We could have one or more that emphasized active participation in sports, for example. Our Life Groups should be focused on people we can introduce to Jesus Christ rather than just for our own encouragement and comfort. How easy it could be to invite people you meet while golfing to your Life Group full of golfers, for example.

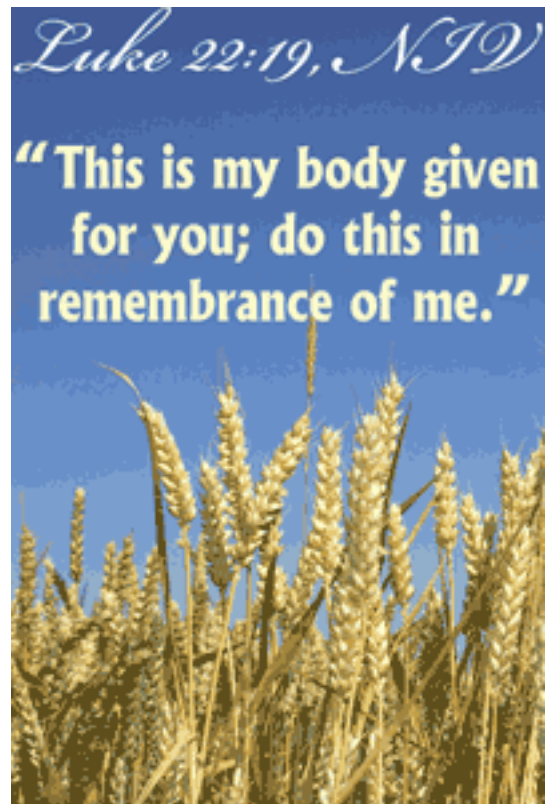
